Louisianians Agree: Chemistry Is Essential

Americans across political lines recognize the critical importance of the chemical industry to our nation's economic and technological advancements. And, they agree that it is imperative for policymakers to improve the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) so that the chemical industry can continue to innovate and thrive.

An overwhelming number of **Louisianians** agree that chemistry is integral to our economy. **They say the chemical industry is essential** to the following:

83% Technological innovation in the U.S.





of Louisianians believe EPA should make multiple determinations on a chemical's safety—they want the agency to specify which uses are safe and which are unsafe rather than labeling the entire chemical as a risk.

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Louisianians believe that when EPA reviews new chemicals it needs to meet its 90-day statutory deadline to support the following:
