And, they agree that it is imperative for policymakers to improve the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) so that the chemical industry can continue to innovate and thrive.

An overwhelming number of **Pennsylvanians** agree that chemistry is integral to our economy. **They say the chemical industry is essential** to the following:

**82%** Consumer products


**79%** U.S.'s competitive edge over foreign countries


## **Pennsylvanians Agree: Fix TSCA**

of Pennsylvanians believe that when personal protective equipment (PPE) is required, the EPA should consider its use when evaluating chemical safety.

of Pennsylvanians believe EPA should make multiple determinations on a chemical's safety—they want the agency to specify which uses are safe and which are unsafe rather than labeling the entire chemical as a risk.
